PRRD advised to rest until weekend: Go

MANILA -- President Rodrigo Duterte was advised to rest and take pain medications following the pain he has been experiencing on the spinal pelvic area of his body, Senator Christopher “Bong” Go said on Wednesday.
Go did not provide much detail on the President’s medical checkup or which hospital he visited at dawn Wednesday. However, he admitted that Duterte was advised to rest until the weekend and to avoid walking too much.
The former aide said the President was also given pain killers for his “muscle spasms” and underwent a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) scan.
“May mga medisina na dapat at kailangan po magpahinga ang Pangulo (The President has to take some medicines and needs to rest). He was advised to

rest,” Go said in an interview over PTV-4.
“Sakit n’ya ngayon, muscle spasm lang: Ang kinabalahala namin at first kung tinamaan ang kanyang spine since it was unbearable pain nga po ang nararamdaman niya kahapon pero salamat po sa Panginoon at wala naman pong dapat ikabahala (His diagnosis now is just muscle spasms. What we were worried about at first is if his spine was injured since he experienced unbearable pain yesterday but thank God there is no cause for concern),” he added.
Go also said Duterte’s minor motorcycle accident last week was “most likely” the cause of his back pain since he had difficulty bending.
He said the President started complaining about back pain during his flight to Japan and he was asked to purchase a cane while there.

“Papunta pa yata ng Japan, pero mas grabe nung nasa Japan na. Siguro sa lamig din siguro (I think the pain started when he was on his way to Japan but it worsened when we reached Japan. Perhaps it’s because of the cold weather),” Go said.
Meanwhile, Go reassured the public that Duterte’s medical condition is no cause for concern.
“Ako na po ang mag-assure sa inyo (I can assure you) nothing to worry, purely muscle spasms po yun at kailangan lang po niya ng pahinga ng ating Pangulo (and all the President needs is rest),” Go said.
Go said Duterte will be welcoming Chinese Vice Premier Hu Chuanhua on Thursday despite being advised to rest.
“Darating ang Vice Premier ng China tomorrow, haharapin niya ito.

2 nabbed for buying liquor using fake checks

MANILA -- The National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) has nabbed two individuals who scammed liquor wholesalers and distributors by pretending to be officials of the Philippine Amusement and Gaming Corporation (Pagcor) and the Filipino Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FFCCCII) to acquire millions of pesos worth of local brandy using fake checks.
In a press briefing Wednesday, the NBI Special Task Force presented suspects Joseph Lua of Barangay Santo Rosario in Capas, Tarlac; and Elizabeth Torres of Dagat-dagatan, Navotas who were nabbed in an entrapment operation in Malabon City on October 18, a day after their latest scam.
The two pretended to be representatives of the FFCCCII and Pagcor to victimize local businesses using fake and falsified checks under the name of the said institutions.
The first transaction was on September 27 when a man introducing himself as Michael Tan from the FFCCCII ordered premium liquors

amounting to PHP486,480. They agreed to meet at an undisclosed storage area where Tan picked up the goods and paid with a check.
The check upon deposit was returned for being outdated.
On September 28, another call was received from a man this time introducing himself as Philip Dy and ordered 100 cases of liquor.
They agreed to meet in Eastwood. A certain "Jeric" arrived to pick up the liquor and paid with a check amounting to PHP649,900. The check was declined by the bank as it was fake.
The latest incident happened on October 17 when a certain lawyer Jose Tria purportedly of Pagcor ordered 1,000 bottles and agreed to meet at Winford Hotel in Manila.
The delivered items were tagged by the NBI with global positioning system (GPS) trackers which allowed lawmen to apprehend the products while it was being transferred to another truck in Malabon City. (PNA)

Hospital group’s threat an attack on people’s rights to UHC

MANILA -- Senator Risa Hontiveros on Wednesday chided the Private Hospitals Association of the Philippines, Inc. (PHAPI) after the group threatened not to renew its members' PhilHealth accreditation over unpaid claims, saying the move is an “attack on the people’s right to universal health care.”
"Amid epidemics left and right, the threat by several private hospitals not to renew their PhilHealth accreditation and deny service to (PhilHealth) members is not only shocking and callous, but it also borders on the criminal," Hontiveros said in a statement.
"Ang mga hospital ay dapat nanggagamot, hindi nananakot at nagdadamot (Hospitals should be treating people, not threatening

and denying treatment)," she added.
The senator said she hopes that PHAPI will reconsider its plan, as millions of PhilHealth members would be deprived of access to adequate hospital care and treatment.
However, Hontiveros warned that if the association makes good its threat, the government might as well revoke the PHAPI members' license to operate.
"I hear the concern of some private hospitals. I understand the need to balance the right to do business and provide health care services. But threatening the public with health care denial is wrong and again, cannot be tolerated," she said.
“I know that the majority of private hospitals don’t think this way. But to those who think they can take hostage the people’s right to universal health care, you are in the wrong business,” Hontiveros said. (PNA)

PH airports expect 8% rise in passenger volume during 'Undas'

MANILA -- All the 42 airports operated by the Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines (CAAP) are now ready for the passenger influx this "Undas" (All Saint's Day), a spokesperson announced on Wednesday.
Eric Apolonio said generally, there is an average of 8 percent increase in the passenger volume every "Undas".
He said for the whole month of November in 2018, the CAAP airports have welcomed 2,085,148 domestic and international passengers.

CAAP has already coordinated with the Office for Transport Security and the PNP Aviation Security Group with regard to baggage screening and security. Additional security measures will also be observed.
In a statement on Wednesday, CAAP has advised passengers not to bring prohibited items for faster screening at the checkpoints.
Earlier, the Manila International Airport Authority (MIAA) also announced its readiness for the expected passenger influx.
There will be help desks at the Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA) where passengers could inquire regarding their concerns. MIAA general manager Ed Monreal also met with airline operators to give them guidelines for a smoother operation.
Flag carrier Philippine Airlines (PAL) reminded its customers to be at the airport three hours before the flight schedule (international) and two hours before a domestic flight.
Passengers are advised to check their flight status before heading to the airport.
